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

Targeted Immunotherapy: Testing a Novel Monoclonal Antibody, Inotuzumab Ozogamicin, in Patients with Recurrent or Refractory CD22-positive B-cell Acute lymphoblastic leukemia

Inotuzumab Ozogamicin is a investigational antibody-drug conjugate (ADC) comprised of a monoclonal antibody targeting CD22, a cell surface antigen expressed on approximately 90 percent of B-cell malignancies, linked to a cytotoxic agent (calicheamicin). When inotuzumab ozogamicin binds to the CD22 antigen on malignant B-cells, it is absorbed into the cell, at which point the cytotoxic agent calicheamicin is released to destroy the cell. Calicheamincin is a bacteria that was first discovered in caliche clay and was found to be toxic to normal and cancerous cells. Linking an antibody-drug conjugate (ADC) such as inotuzumab ozogamicin to a cytotoxic agent may allow chemotherapy to directly target the cancer cell. (See diagram below). This agent is currently being studied in the COG Study, AALL1621, which is evaluating the toxicity profile and preliminary efficacy of inotuzumab ozogamicin (InO) in pediatric patients with CD22-positive B-lymphoblastic leukemia that is refractory or in second or greater relapse.



How is the Drug Administered to the Patient?

Inotuzumab Ozogamicin (InO) is given IV over 1 hour. Usual dosing for the Cycle 1 of therapy is 0.8 mg/m²/dose on Day 1 of therapy and 0.5 mg/m²/dose on Days 8 and 15 of the 28 day cycle. If patient has a complete remission after Cycle 1 then dosing will start with 0.5 mg/m²/dose for Days 1, 8, and 15 of a 28 day cycle. If patient has a partial response or stable disease after Cycle 1 then dosing will be 0.8 mg/m²/dose on Day 1 and 0.5 mg/m²/dose on Days 8 and 15 of the 28 day cycle. Patients will receive premeds with Tylenol, Benadryl and Hydrocortisone 30 to 60 minutes prior to each infusion due to the high risk of infusion reactions. NOTE: Inotuzumab Ozogamicin is light sensitive and must be protected from light during preparation and administration using UV protective covering.

Common Side Effects of Drug:

- **Infusion Reactions:** fever, chills, hypotension, tachycardia, weakness or lack of energy and strength, headache, rash.
- Increase Liver Function Tests (ALT/AST, T. Bili); hepatic toxicity as severe as SOS/VOD has been reported.
- Nausea and Vomiting (however, InO has a low emetic potential).
- Abdominal pain, diarrhea
- Tumor Lysis Syndrome depending on tumor burden

In cases of severe infusion reactions, notify the physician; the infusion should be stopped and appropriate medical treatment should be administered such as steroids, epinephrine, bronchodilators and oxygen.

Special Considerations and Monitoring Required:

- Obtain baseline vital signs immediately prior to initiation of infusion, 15 minutes after the start of the infusion, 30 minutes after the start of the infusion and at the end of infusion as well as 1 hour after the completion of the infusion. Monitor for infusion reactions and be prepared to administer emergency medications/oxygen as ordered if patient experiences a severe infusion-related reaction.
- If patients have high tumor burden, monitor for signs and symptoms of tumor lysis syndrome especially with the first dose of **Inotuzumab Ozogamicin**.
- Monitor Chemistry Panels for increased liver function tests and bilirubin as to determine trends of hepatic toxicity concerns leading to SOS/VOD.
- Due to risk of hepatic toxicity, co-administration of hepatotoxic medications should be minimized (i.e. Tylenol use beyond premedication use and avoidance of azoles for antifungal prophylaxis) when possible.
